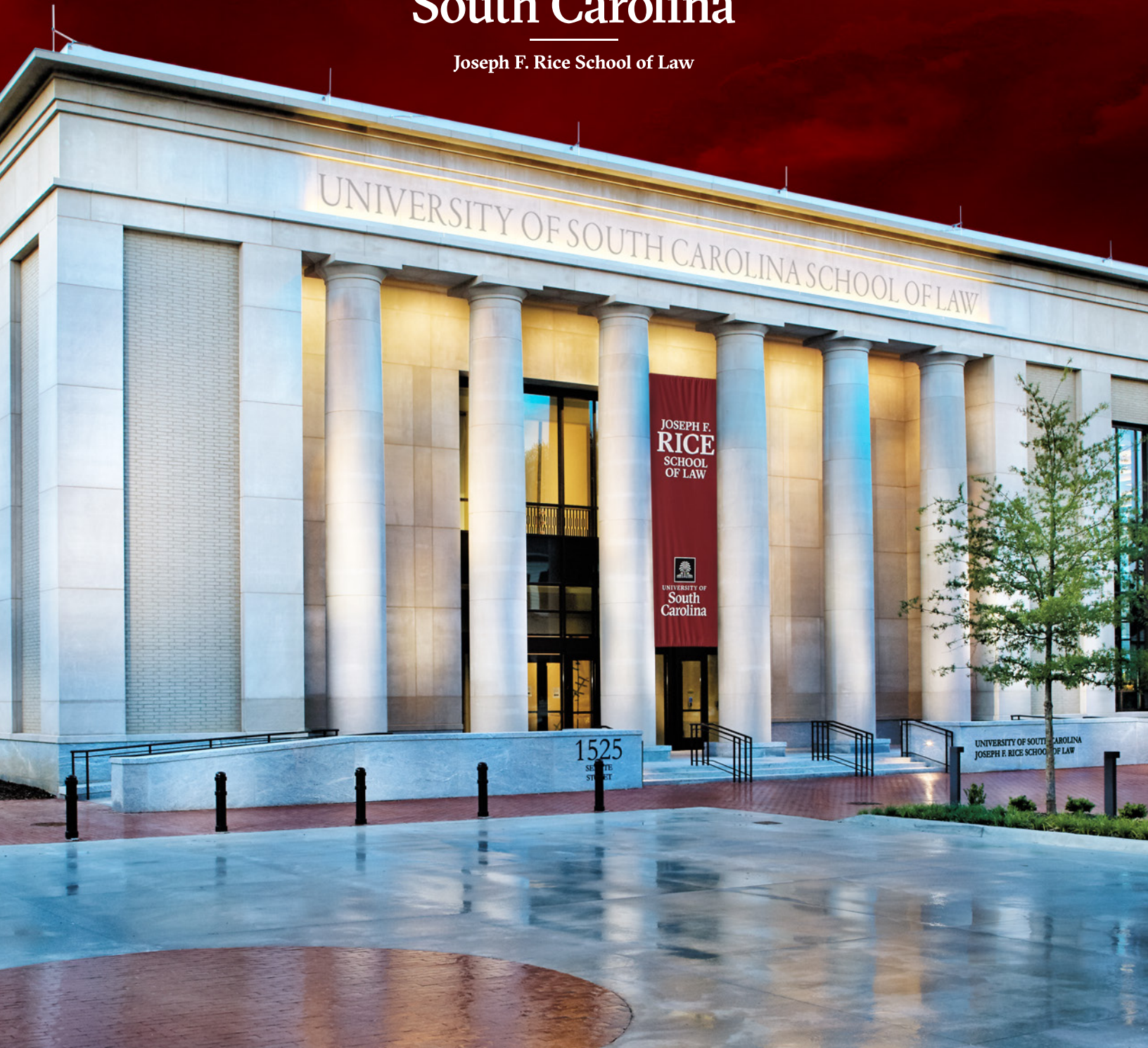

The Juris Doctor (J.D.) program is a three-year, full-time program requiring 90 credits.

CAPSTONE COURSES encourage you to apply the skills you've learned by working with lawyers, judges, professors, and peers in a simulated practice environment in such areas as Federal Criminal Practice, Small Business Organizations, Civil Litigation, and Real Estate Transactions.

SUMMER PUBLIC INTEREST INTERNSHIP GRANTS, established through generous donations by the Jeffcoat Law Firm, allow students to apply to work with organizations assisting South Carolina community members who need help to obtain legal assistance. As public interest opportunities are often unpaid, the law school secured dedicated funding for student stipends, exhibiting its commitment to community service.

PRO BONO PROGRAM is the first entirely voluntary Pro Bono Program in the nation and offers students the opportunity to get involved in more than 25 service projects, strengthening professional skills and building contacts while giving back. Because it is voluntary, the program emphasizes how pro bono services are an inherent part of a lawyer's professional identity.

Collaborations and Partnerships

As a student at the USC Rice School of Law, you can choose from an array of programs designed to complement your formal classroom learning, build skills, and enhance competencies to advance your career.

THE CAROLINA LAW RESEARCH SCHOLARS PROGRAM

enables eligible South Carolina residents access to our most robust scholarship program. Full tuition is offered for the 1L year along with tuition and fee waivers for the 2L and 3L years. Scholars also earn a stipend while engaged in research or projects with law faculty or other legal professionals. To be considered, candidates must have an LSAT score of 164 or higher and a 3.75 UGPA or higher as reflected on the LSAC CAS report.

THE CHILDREN'S LAW CENTER offers classes, research opportunities, and training for students, practitioners, policy makers, and professionals involved in children's safety and well-being. The center prioritizes hands-on experiences, connecting you with experts in their field.

THE NATIONAL ADVOCACY CENTER houses the U.S. Department of Justice's premiere training facility and is located directly on the university campus. The USC Rice School of Law frequently collaborates with the NAC, offering our students access to national and international experts that can't be found anywhere else.

THE UNIVERSITY'S RULE OF LAW COLLABORATIVE works with national and international organizations to strengthen the rule of law around the world. Selected students participate directly in the work of the Collaborative.

THE NELSON MULLINS RILEY & SCARBOROUGH CENTER ON PROFESSIONALISM

enriches student experiences through mentoring, research, and events that promote professionalism, civic leadership, and public service in the practice of law.

Preparation for Practice

THE UNIFORM BAR EXAMINATION is a uniformly administered and graded bar examination with a portable score that can be used to apply for bar admission in other participating states or jurisdictions. More than two-thirds of states in the U.S., including South Carolina, have adopted the UBE. It is designed to test knowledge and skills that every lawyer should be able to demonstrate prior to becoming licensed to practice law. The University of South Carolina Joseph F. Rice School of Law is named for Joe Rice (USC JD '79; BSA '76).

He started practicing in Barnwell, SC after graduating from law school in 1979. Working closely beside his mentor, the late Ron Motley (USC JD '71; BA '66), Joe structured some of the most significant resolutions on behalf of workers injured by asbestos-related products and served as lead negotiating counsel on the 1998 National Tobacco Settlement.

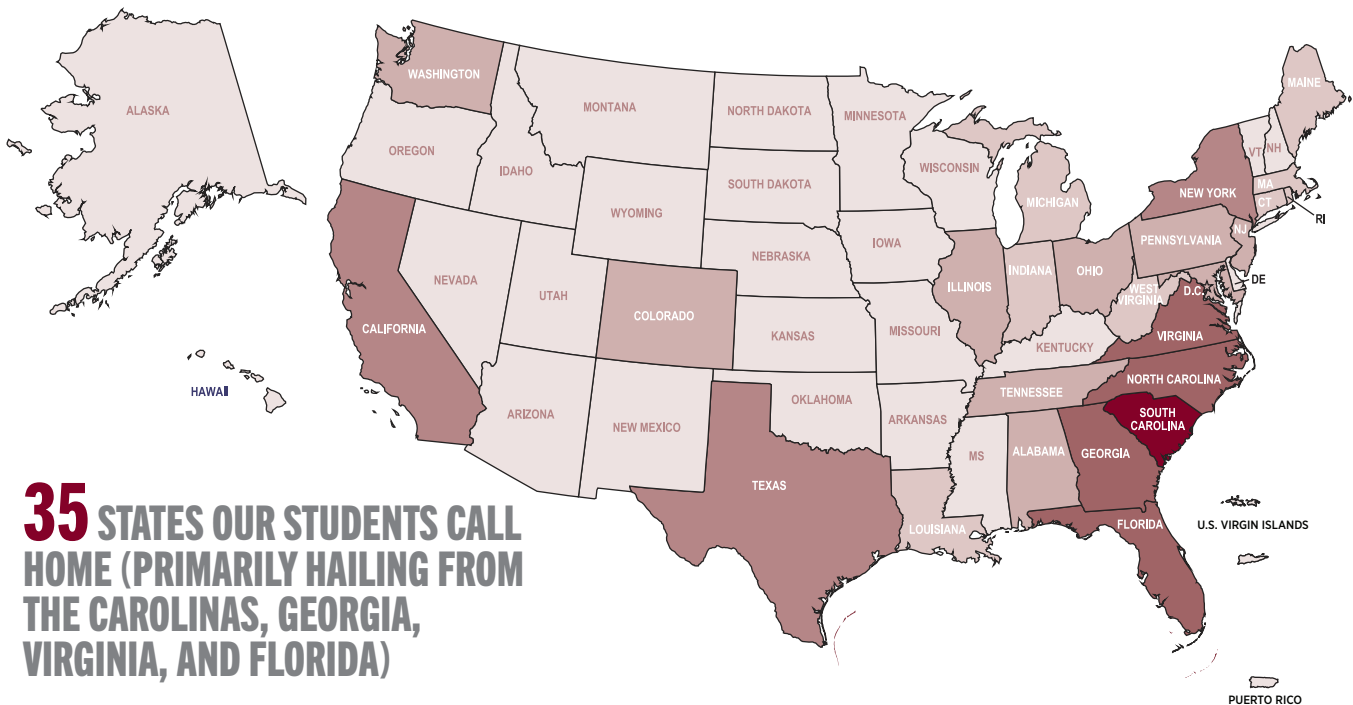
In 2003, Joe co-founded Motley Rice LLC, currently one of the nation's largest plaintiffs' litigation firms. Motley Rice remains headquartered in Mt. Pleasant, SC, where Joe leads more than 120 attorneys who handle individual, class action, and multidistrict litigation in a variety of areas including: occupational disease, medical device and pharmaceutical injuries, securities fraud, consumer protection, whistleblower rights, anti-terrorism, environmental contamination, catastrophic injuries, premise and product liability, and wrongful death.

Rice is very active in the firm's cause-driven litigation for clients. He currently serves as a co-lead lawyer for more than 3,000 plaintiffs in National Prescription Opiate MDL 2804 aimed at combatting the alleged over-distribution and deceptive marketing of prescription opioids. As chair of the Negotiating Committee, he has worked to reach over \$50 billion in settlements for communities nationwide. He also serves as co-lead in the national AFFF MDL 2873 litigation and on the resolution committee of the Camp Lejeune Water litigation.

Joe Rice, along with his wife Lisa (USC BA '77), and daughter Ann E. Rice Ervin (USC JD '09; BA '06) have provided numerous resources to the University over the years. Their gifts provide for endowed scholarships, professorships as well as championing the law school's Children's Law Program.

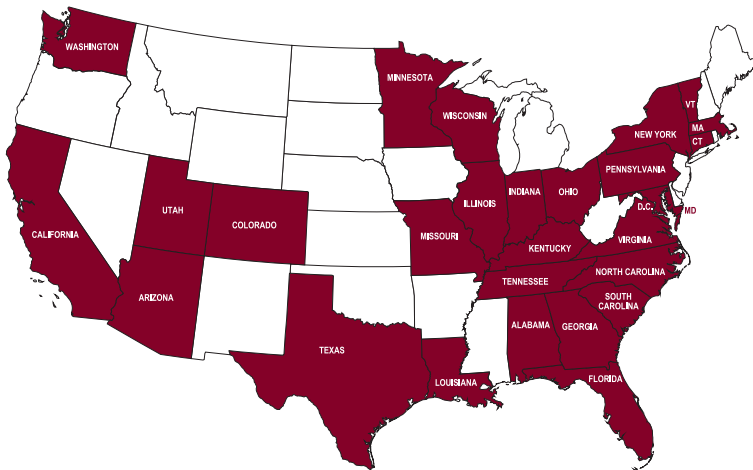

Graduate Employment Summary

Class of 2023

SOUTH CAROLINA GRADUATES GET JOBS

USC Rice School of Law graduates engage in experiences that open their eyes - and open doors - to employment opportunities. Eighty-three percent (83.64%) of USC Rice Law's 2023 graduates took jobs requiring bar passage, surpassing the record-high national rate of 82.1% for this "gold standard" employment outcome. Forty (40), or 18.69% of our Class of 2023 graduates, continued the pattern established by previous classes of accepting judicial clerkships at a significantly higher level than graduates nationwide. Just 10.4% of 2023 graduates nationwide reported judicial clerkships as their first post-graduate job.

98.84% of all employed graduates accepted a job for which bar passage was required or a JD was an advantage

20% of all employed graduates (18.69% of all graduates) accepted a judicial clerkship

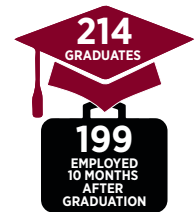

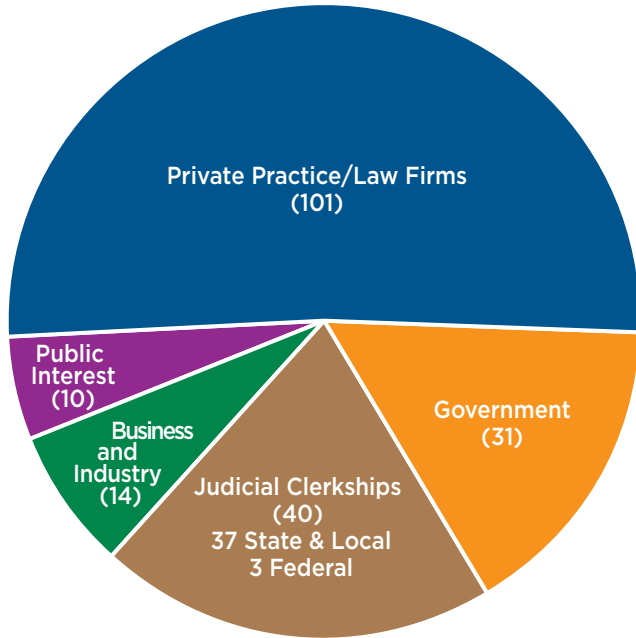

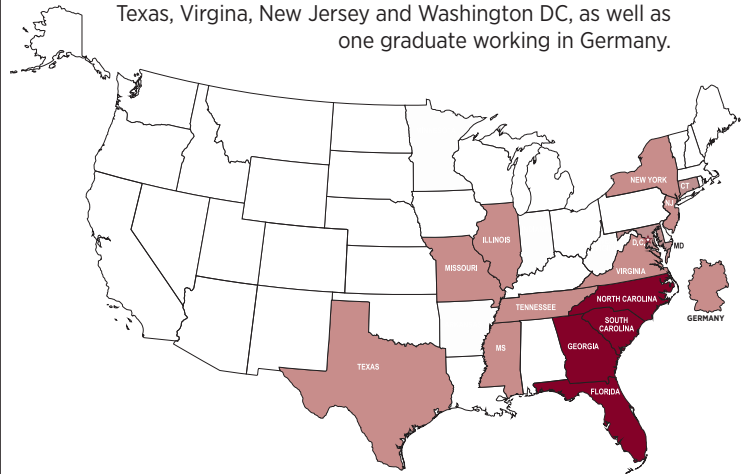
CAREER AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT
